## Narratives

### Mitigation Needs Assessment:

Florida's Mitigation Program planning goal is to work with federal, regional and local partners to safeguard against loss of life and injury, disruptions to essential public services and infrastructure, economic impacts to residents and businesses, and losses to civic, cultural, and environmental resources. Florida's Mitigation Strategy is built on a comprehensive Risk Based Mitigation Needs Assessment that has identified flooding, severe storms, tropical cyclones, coastal erosion and wildfires as the most significant risks to Floridians.

Further, Florida's mitigation planning strategy seeks to protect seven critical community lifelines:

1. Safety and Security
2. Food, Water and Shelter
3. Health and Medical
4. Energy
5. Communications
6. Transportation
7. Hazardous Material

DEO, alongside other state agencies and local communities, has sought to engage with and seek input from local, state and federal partners on their disaster mitigation needs and priorities. DEO held statewide webinars, multiple regional workshops and sought input from community partners statewide through a survey to gather feedback from Florida communities on their mitigation priorities.

### Proposed Use of Funds:

DEO is the lead agency and responsible entity for administering more than \$633 million in funds allocated to the state for mitigation and resiliency efforts through the Community Development Block Grant-Mitigation program. In accordance with the Federal Register, DEO's aggregate total for indirect costs and administrative and technical assistance expenditures will not exceed 5% of its total grant (\$31,674,250) plus program income. Planning costs are subject to the 15% cap (\$95,022,750) defined in 42 U.S.C. 5305(a) (12). The state is proposing a budget of 5% (\$31,810,750). Per the Federal Register, CDBG-MIT funds can be used to meet a matching requirement, share or contribution for other federal grant programs if they are used to carry out an eligible mitigation activity. This includes mitigation grants administered by FEMA and the United States Army Corps of Engineers. (The maximum amount for the USACE is \$250,000.) Activities that are funded with match dollars must meet the definition of a mitigation activity and must meet the eligibility requirements for the CDBG-MIT program and the federal program that is being aided with CDBG-MIT funds. Eligible project delivery costs are presumed included as a portion of the overall CDBG-MIT grant funding allocation provided to each subrecipient. DEO will limit spending to a maximum of 13% of the total grant amount on a combination of planning and indirect and direct program administration costs. Subrecipients will be responsible for properly tracking and monitoring the expenses that may not be included as part of the overall grant award to each individual project or individual applicant as applicable.

DEO proposes two primary mitigation categories; Infrastructure and Planning. Within these two categories are programs that focus on risk reduction for the hazards identified in the state Action Plan's risk-based mitigation needs assessment. These hazards include flooding, severe storms, tropical cyclones, coastal erosion and wildfires.

Eligible CDBG-MIT activities are set forth in the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (HCDA). HCDA activities that meet the criteria for both Infrastructure and Planning include: the payment of the non-Federal share required in



connection with a Federal grant-in-aid program undertaken as part of activities assisted under this Title 48 and the provision of assistance including loans (both interim and long-term) and grants for activities which are carried out by public or private nonprofit entities, including: acquisition of real property; acquisition, construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation or installation of public facilities (except for buildings for the general conduct of government), site improvements, and utilities, and commercial or industrial buildings or structures and other commercial or industrial real property improvements; and planning.

## Overall Progress Narrative:

The State of Florida’s Mitigation Action Plan, which encompasses three programs, was approved by HUD in April 2020. The \$20,000,000 General Planning Support (GPS) program was the first to be awarded, followed by the \$75,000,000 Critical Facility Hardening Program (CFHP), the \$150,000,000 Round I General Infrastructure Program (GIP), and the \$175,000,000 Round II GIP.

Due to the rising costs of materials and construction and the industrial impacts of recent national disasters, as well as COVID-19-related production issues, a large portion of the \$150,000,000 originally allocated for Round III of the Mitigation GIP was redirected to CDBG-Disaster Recovery’s Hurricane Irma Housing Repair projects. The CDBG-MIT Action Plan was amended to include these projects as the GIP Round III projects.

In August 2021, a Substantial Amendment to the Action Plan was approved that provided for an allocation of \$46,926,00 to be used exclusively for general infrastructure mitigation projects in Michael-Impacted communities.

The Mitigation programs have all been offered to counties, municipalities, state agencies, and to non-profits and regional planning councils that applied in partnership with their county, local municipality, or a state agency. The GPS program also allowed educational institutions to apply. Minimum and maximum awards by program were \$20,000/\$10,000,000 for the GPS program; \$50,000/\$15,000,000 for the CFHP; \$500,000/\$150,000,000 for the Round I GIP; \$2,000,000/\$175,000,000 for the Round II GIP; and \$500,000/\$42,223,400 for the GIP for Michael-impacted Communities.

DEO has a robust website that includes its Action Plan, Program Guidelines, Frequently Asked Questions, Policies and Procedures, and detailed application guidance for each program. DEO hosted webinars for all of its programs to provide an overview of the Guidelines specific to the application process. DEO also provides an opportunity for applicants to schedule one-on-one phone calls with DEO’s mitigation staff. These calls give applicants an opportunity to ask questions and/or discuss issues specific to their projects. Additional on-going technical assistance was provided throughout the application cycles through a publicized email address.

Application cycles by program were April 15 to June 30, 2020, for the CFHP; May 15 to July 31, 2020 for the GPS program; June 15 to September 14, 2020 for the Round I GIP; June 16 to September 17, 2021 for the Round II GIP; and March 11 to June 24, 2022 for the Michael-Impacted Communities GIP. DEO used an on-line application platform (Qualtrics) for all five application cycles.

The CFHP received 356 applications with a total funding request of nearly \$369,000,000. The GPS program received 121 applications with a total funding request in excess of \$103,000,000. The Round I GIP received 403 applications with a total funding request of \$2,229,631,879. The Round II GIP received 246 applications with a total funding request of \$2,124,772,559. The GIP for Michael-impacted Communities received 50 applications with a total funding request of \$151,130,954.

DEO applied a two-phase process to review all applications. In Phase One, applications were evaluated for Mandatory Threshold Compliance Criteria (ref.: Table 5, in Guidelines). This Phase was unscored. In Phase Two, if the Mandatory Threshold Criteria were in compliance, the application was reviewed and scored based on a Scoring Criteria Evaluation Rubric, (Ref.: Table 6, in Guidelines).

The top applicants in each program were invited to present their projects through virtual visits and/or on-site visits. The primary objective of these visits was to address any issues that could impact an award decision. A minimum of two members of the OLTR staff were in attendance for each visit. The teams collaborated after each visit to discuss project quality, management capacity, and any requested follow-up information.

After the visits and follow-up discussions, the highest-ranked applications were recommended to DEO Leadership for funding. After Leadership’s review and approval, applications were funded, in order of ranking, to the greatest extent allowed by available funding.

OLTR teams made CFHP site visits in October and November 2020. Round I GIP on-site visits occurred in March 2021. Round II GIP visits were in October and November 2021. In September 2002, site visits for the Michael-Impacted Communities were conducted and project award recommendations were made to DEO Leadership.

Florida’s Governor announced the 37 GPS award recipients in January 2021; 61 CFHP award recipients in February 2021;



20 Round I GIP award recipients in April 2021; 17 Round II GIP award recipients in January and February 2022; and 18 GIP-MIT for Michael-Impacted Communities award recipients in October 2022. Intent to Award Letters were sent to project contacts along with a notice that DEO would soon reach out regarding the development of Scopes of Work (SOW). OLTR conducted an onboarding webinar for all GPS awardees on January 20, 2021, and for both GPS and CFHP awardees on February 12, 2021. The Round I GIP onboarding was held on June 24, 2021. Round II GIP and Michael-Impacted Communities onboarding was conducted via teleconferences and training directly with project staff. Information regarding the initial sub-recipient agreement process requirements and DEO’s expectations was covered.

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**Activity Description:**

The proposed project will retrofit the fire station to withstand winds in excess of 225 mph and minimize outage times at the station. These upgrades will mitigate the risk of losing the facility's emergency support functions and increases public safety. Fire Station No. 1 will be able to weather a severe storm event without compromising its lifesaving operations. This project, which consists of the installation of hurricane resistant windows, a new roof, a generator, and other hardening measures as needed to secure the operational capability of Fire Station No. 1 during hurricanes and severe storms. The fire district served by Station No. 1 includes a population of 11,141, as well as the Good Samaritan Hospital and the West Palm Beach Police Headquarters.

## Activity Progress Narrative:

The GPS program was offered to support high-quality mitigation planning that builds a foundation for continuous coordination and data-driven outcomes throughout the state. Approved projects were to be oriented towards multi-jurisdictional planning that mitigated high-impact hazards and presented realistic solutions for addressing these hazards. The GPS application cycle opened on May 15, 2020, and closed on July 31, 2020. A total of 121 applications were received by the deadline with a total funding request in excess of \$103,000,000. The three-person scoring team evaluated applications independently consistent with the Scoring Criteria Evaluation Rubric. Their scores were averaged to determine a final score for each application. Applicants were recommended in rank order based on evaluation scores.

The top applicants presented their projects through virtual visits between September and October 2020. A minimum of three members of the Mitigation Team was in attendance for each visit. They collaborated after each presentation to determine the content of post-visit follow-up emails. The emails requested copies of the virtual visit PowerPoint presentations and asked questions regarding any outstanding issues. Responses were reviewed and retained in applicant files. Following the receipt of the responses to post-virtual visit emails, the highest-ranked applications were recommended to DEO Leadership for funding. Applications were funded, in order of ranking, to the greatest extent allowed by available funding. A press release from Florida's Governor announced the award winners on January 8, 2021. Ultimately, 37 projects totaling \$19,965,000 were funded. Intent to Award Letters were sent by January 12, 2021. These letters indicated that DEO would soon reach out regarding SOW development. By agreement of both parties, one entity's Intent to Award was withdrawn in May 2021, leaving 36 projects that are currently moving forward.

DEO conducted a virtual 90-minute orientation for all GPS awardees on January 20, 2021, and again on February 12, 2021, for CFHP awardees and for any GPS entities that may have missed the first orientation. Mitigation team members were introduced and information regarding the initial sub-recipient agreement process requirements and DEO's expectations was covered. A question-and-answer period followed DEO's presentation. Assignments for all projects were made and shared among the Mitigation Team's Grant Managers by February 2021. Introductions and contact information was subsequently provided via email. The Grant Managers, working with Analysts, drafted a Scope of Work (SOW) for each project and shared them with their assigned subrecipients as a starting point for creating their own. The SOW refinement process continued through emails and teleconferences and concluded over the course of several months. Grant Managers also requested, and received, copies of their subrecipient's county/city procurement policies and procedures, along with any project related RFQ/RFPs. These documents were evaluated as they arrived for compliance with DEO's and HUD's requirements.

As of December 31, 2022: All 36 subrecipients had fully executed agreements.
